Housekeeping

J Wano

Just a few housekeeping rules I'd like to share. Like everybody knows, no smoking in the whare and lunch will be at 12.30pm today.

Voting

At the moment there are two voting processes, one is by ballot and the, sorry about this, I'm just a little bit lost at the moment for myself, but we have two processes in place for the voting. One is by voting ballot and the other one is by shares so I'd just like to ask the meeting here today what process would you like to use for today.

H Ratima (224)

Isn't that part of the Trust Deed?

J Wano

Yes.

H Sullivan (249)

Does that include proxy votes, a show of hands?

J Wano

I'm asking the floor how they would like to go through the process of voting.

J McInnes

There are number of ways voting can happen. Clause 7(c) of the Trust Order states that the method of voting shall be by way of a show of hands or by poll if demanded by five (5) or more owners present.

Usually, voting on resolutions is by a show of hands which means holding up your owner/proxy cards. So as owners, you need to decide how you want the voting to proceed.

J Wano

Thanks Jarron.

H Ratima (224)

Mr Chair, can we make sure that it's owners putting their hands up please, only owners.

T Houppapa

Excuse me Mr Chair, the proxies don't have their registration cards.

J Wano

Come to order please. Can we just hold on second please, the proxies haven't been allocated their cards yet so we'll give those out. Sorry about this.

N Baker (502)

Mr Chair, just a point of order. The proxy holders, don't they have to be owners?

J Wano They are representing the owners.

N Baker (502) The one holding the proxy, doesn't that person have to be an owner? I think that was stipulated at the last AGM.

J Wano No, it's not in the clause.

N Baker (502) Well then the only ones that can vote with a green card, the proxy holders are the owners only, not the proxy holders.

J Wano No. They're here on behalf of the owners.

N Baker (502) But they're not owners.

J Wano And they're voting on behalf of them.

N Baker (502) I think what's confusing Mr Chair, at the last AGM...

J Wano Can we have order please. Can we have some quiet.

N Baker (502) At the last AGM we had, it was determined also at the Court that proxy holders must be owners to hold the proxy.

J Wano I can't speak on behalf of the last owners or shareholders or the last minutes. We have got...

N Baker (502) Well what has happened is we end up with two different processes. Some come along that aren't owners holding a proxy and some come along as owners to hold a proxy. Do you know what I mean, we've got two different processes.

J Wano We've got a process in place and we've done our homework on it, and it is within the requirements of our Trust Deed. So is that okay.

H Ratima (224) Mr Chair, on the proxy form it says that you have to be an owner to receive a proxy, on the proxy form that you sent out.

N Baker (502) It's confusing Mr Chair.

H Ratima (224) Well that's the one that we got. Now you've changed it to another process.

J Wano We have got a process and we agreed to the process. I'll just ask for clarification just for your sake Henare but you've been at all the meetings.

H Ratima (224) I mean, the proxy forms that were sent out John said you had to be an owner to hold a proxy.

J Wano Kia ora tatou. This is Traci our administrator, on behalf of the Board.

T Houpapa Mihi to hui. Thank you very much Mr Chair for allowing us to speak to this.

With regards to the process for proxies, it would appear from your Trust Order that you do not have to be an owner to be a proxy holder. Of course, in order for a vote to be put, you do need to be an owner. The proposed process adheres to the Maori Land Court requirements, that those proxy holders who are here and who are representing the interests on behalf of those owners who are not here, are valid. We've got some people who are here in their own right which is lovely, so just clarifying that for you Mr Chair. Kia ora ano tatou.

J Wano Kia ora Traci, thank you. So I put it back to the floor that a process of voting for us when we vote. Can I ask from the floor.

H Edwards (253, 254) Excuse me Mr Chairman. My whanau would like to vote by shareholding.

J Wano Kia ora. Can we put that as a motion to the floor.

A Gray (36) Is that the show of hands for the first motion?

J Wano Are we still working on the first motion?

A Gray (36) A show of hands was the first motion, then we were waiting for the proxies.

J Wano Yes, sorry we were. So the first motion was from Nigel for a show of hands

Resolution: Nigel Baker (502) / Henare Ratima (224)

"That voting be conducted by a show of hands"

Resolution: Horo Edwards (253, 254) / Kararaina Osborne (505)

"That voting be conducted by shareholding"

N Baker (502) So we're voting on a show of hands but now the other resolution has come in so that's on the floor to discuss as well.

J Wano So we've got two on the table and we're going to go to a show of hands or support for Horo's vote seconded by Kataraina. I'm just trying to get myself around this too.

K Osborne (505) My name is Kararaina.

J Wano Kararaina, kia ora.

A Gray (36) Sorry Mr Chair, so with the first motion, obviously if people vote on that it's either going to be the first or the second motion so if they vote a show of hands to tally on that one and then you do a vote on the second motion that should clear up which motion to pass.

J Wano Yes we have two motions right now.

T Houpapa Point of order Mr Chair. Just for clarification so that we can move through this process and onto the meeting.

E hoa ma, you've got two things that you're voting on today. One, you're voting just general resolutions such as the apologies. The other is for the elections of two new trustees.

Typically what happens in land meetings is you vote by a show of hands for general resolutions. The second voting process for today is the election of trustees. That's when you need to decide as owners whether you want to vote for your new trustees by a show of hands or whether you want to vote by poll.

Kei a koutou te tikanga. It's up to you how you want to vote but in the first instance, decide how you want to vote on general resolutions. Get that out of the way and then make a decision about how you want on the trustee elections. Kei a koe Mr Chair.

- J Wano Kia ora Traci. Sorry people.
- T Houpapa And if you are voting, please hold up your registration cards so that we can record it. Kia ora ano koutou.
- J Wano Do you understand? Sorry about the confusion. Can we vote on that, on the resolution.
- N Baker (502) Normally Mr Chairman, I was going to say before, normally you have a discussion. I didn't make the confusion, it was the administration so we need to sort it out. Ka pai. Suddenly we've got another motion on the books saying that shareholders. That wasn't in the information pack. It was based on proxy. It's written. So we need to sort it out Mr Chairman.
- J Wano Can we go back over the proxy form please Traci, just for clarification.
- T Houpapa The proxy process is determined by the Maori Land Court and Maori Land Law.
- If you are an owner, and you cannot attend the land meeting, and you would like your vote represented at the meeting then you can appoint a proxy in your place. So if you are an owner and you're not here but you want one of your family to represent you and vote on your behalf, then you appoint that person as your proxy.
- There is a time period for proxies to be received and this was determined and notified by the Trust. We received a number of proxies in the mail by that time, which have been read out and are validated.
- Those of you who have a yellow form are proxy holders because the people that you are acting on behalf of, or voting on behalf of, are not present today. That's why some of you might have yellow forms.
- The green forms are because you are owners or shareholders in Tatarakina C Trust. Now regarding to the voting process, you can now decide how you might want to vote.
- So just to repeat what we were talking about before. For clarification, you're voting about two things. One on general resolutions and how you might like to vote on that, whether it's a show of hands or a poll, and as we mentioned before, the show of hands is typically what you might do for resolutions like who wants to move the minutes when we get there and who seconds that.
- If we're voting for nomination or election of trustees, then you need to decide whether you want a show of hands to vote in trustees, or whether you would like a poll vote which is voting by shares.
- J Wano Henare, can I just explain one thing Henare. You're a trustee and yet you choose to be, I don't know, a shareholder to have a go at the Trust. I would like to know how the people would like to see Henare, as a Trust member or as a shareholder out with the people because he doesn't get a chance to be asked by the people and yet he sits there and has a go at us so I just want to ask the people how you see him. And the other one is George. We can't be interrupted by these guys that have been with us all the time, sitting in our meetings, to prolong the meeting today.
- N Baker (502) Point of order Mr Chair, I don't think we should be criticising anyone in this room, let's get on with the meeting.

J Wano I'm asking. So, Henare, can we carry on with the meeting.

H Ratima (224) I just want to ask a question.

J Wano You'll ask a lot of questions Henare today. Can we move on with the process please.

H Ratima (224) Well I've got an important question.

J Wano All your questions are important Henare to us. Can we get back to the resolutions please so we can move on.

To make this resolution valid we need five people to have the process go through and all we want to do is move on with the process for voting in two places. One in general and one in nominees so can we get past this one.

I Kahukiwa Smith With poll voting you only need five people to agree with that method of voting. If five owners agree that the method of voting is by poll then that is past. You don't need to vote on it as long as five owners agree.

N Baker (502) And that's merely to be advised of the voting of elections. Is that right? That's merely for the voting for the elections, the poll voting.

I Kahukiwa Smith Yes.

N Baker (502) Kia ora.

J Wano Do we understand the question? Is there five owners that want to vote by poll. We've got five for poll voting. We're going to carry on. We've got this poll voting for show of hands. Thank you to those that have helped us move on.

N Baker (502) Mr Chair, there's another process to go with the poll voting and actually you have to prepare ballot papers on behalf of everyone in the room. I know you've already the green ones.

J Wano Thank you Nigel, we've got those.

N Baker (502) Yes.

J Wano Yes, thank you.

N Baker (502) Ka pai.

J Wano Yes, thank you, we have got those. Henare?

H Ratima (224) What happens with poll voting John, we've got two of the highest shareholders in the room, and really that's more shares than the rest of us have got. So, what happens, one person can control the hui. That means one person can control all the votes on shares. So the rest of us who will vote will be out voted because one person holds the most votes in their own right which is nothing wrong with that but that's the problem you'll get into. The rest of us won't ever have a say.

J Wano Kia ora, we've got your point. Thank you everybody for your patience and consideration to what we've just gone through.

Y Broughton (157) John, I just have to ask, were you just making a comment before about Henare and George, or were you actually asking the people where they think Henare and George should be seated at this time. What were you doing?

J Wano I did ask, do you want an answer on it because I can't force them to be...

Y Broughton (157) Personally, as an owner, I would like to see George and Henare up there with you, we voted them in.

J Wano Would you two like to take your places because your places have been set up here.

G Sullivan Would you like me to respond to that.

J Kahukiwa (565) Well you shouldn't because you're a trustee for us all.

G Sullivan Well it goes like this. The reason I'm not up there is because, in the New Year there's going to be very serious allegations made against those five. Applications are going to be filed in Court.

[Expressions of disagreement voiced simultaneously]

J Wano Can we just come back to order. They just want to know whether you want to be up here or you don't want to.

G Sullivan I don't want to be sitting up there with you, for my own reasons.

J Wano Kia ora George, thank you.

Y Broughton (157) Where does that leave us because I think if you can't be a team player on the Trust that we put you all on, think again whether you need to be on the Trust.

J Wano Can we transfer that, if we've got an issue at the end of the meeting to general.

J Kahukiwa (565) I actually agree with you and support you on that. By rights, we put them into that place and they're not there because they have other issues, the wrong issues. Today, they should be sitting up there. Either that or they should resign.

J Wano Thank you Janice. All right, we've got a general feeling. They choose to be where they are, that's fine.

J Wano

J Wano

Those that were at the last meeting can I ask that you confirm.

N Baker (502)

I was there.

H Sullivan (249)

I was there.

J Wano Sorry about the list.

A Gray (36) Mr Chair, if you haven't got the list, I suppose some people that passed those motions were *(inaudible)* in the records you could most probably get them to pass them.

J Wano Yes. Nigel was one of them and Hohepa is the other. Thanks for that.

N Baker (502) Mr Chair, are we on matters arising are we?

J Wano Yes, we're still on them.

N Baker (502) I'd just like to ask a question, in the financials there's an issue there raised about why there was such a huge increase of trustee expenses for the last period. I'd just like to know whether that area has been resolved because I note that this years financials are quite a lot more than they were then, and admin costs.

J Wano The finances are coming up later on in the meeting.

N Baker (502) Yes but it's in the minutes.

J Wano That's the last one not the one's that we're doing now. That was from the last meeting and you accepted that earlier. In other matters from the last meeting.

J Wano The Chair's report, have you had time to read it.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

N Baker (502) Matters arising Mr Chair?

J Wano Yes. Can I ask for matters arising from the financials please.

N Baker (502) Can I relate to my other question that I put before?

J Wano Is it relating to the financials?

- N Baker (502) Yes it is. I've just looked over the last 3 years of financials and there is a very significant increase in the administration costs. I noticed that in 2006/2007 it was \$79,000 and in 2008/2009 it's \$118,000 so the question I raise is, what was the Trust doing about lowering the admin costs. In actual fact, in the last 3 years it's gone up. Why is there an issue? That's a lot of money for administration of a Trust.
- J Wano Thank you for that Nigel. We have engaged a new administration team who have been acting in the best interest of the shareholders. They've taken into account a lot of stuff that has been left from previous to bring up to date. We've certainly have moved ahead and getting all that stuff in place and all those book-keepings and trying to get a presentation like today as well as bringing all our financial statements up to date.
- I feel that we've got the right people that are taking us forward. It states in my report that THS has been a professional outfit that's brought forward our financial outcome. What are you specifically asking for other than, do you want a break-down.
- N Baker (502) I don't think it's about a break-down John.
- J Wano It's the cost that we have taken into place and we accepted it as a Trust Board to take us from where we were to where we are now.
- N Baker (502) Overall I'm talking about the overall cost. Forget about whether it's meeting fees, travel costs, administration by THS, I am concerned at the rising costs of the administration of this Trust.
- Now, the reason why I say that is because it's practically the same as your income. So what you're getting off hunting, fishing licences, logging royalties etc, it's really just going back to pay this Trust to operate for a year and it's just too much.
- J Wano Thank you Nigel. At this time I'd like to ask Ewan Gardiner (Gardiner Knobloch Chartered Accountants Ltd, Napier) to just put a few things in place from the auditors point of view, and clarify just a couple of little things if that's okay with you.
- E Gardiner Morena everybody. I'm not too sure just how far to go with the financials but you can see that the Trust revenue comes from the short period of time when the trees were harvested, and they've been re-planted of course, or some of them have been.
- Interest on the money that you have invested which has been built up from the Nga Whenua Rahui covenant and the forestry proceeds, and hunting and fishing of course as Nigel pointed out.
- The expenses to run a Trust like this can vary of course. A new administration has come along and there's been a lot of things in the Trust that needed to be attended to, to get it to go forward. Things such as strategic planning, changes processes and I think there's probably one or two Court attendances as well. All those things have been wrapped up and attended to in one year and they should carry the Trust forward in style in the future, and the costs shouldn't be as high as they are for this one year that they've been incurred.
- The Trust is in very good shape as you see in the finances. You've got about \$2.3million in the bank. The land is only portrayed at government value in 1996 and we talked about may be raising that but it is only academic.

This Trust is in very good shape, I think the administration team now is excellent from what I have seen and hopefully, we just come in at the end of the year and do the financial statements and get those all tickety boo for the auditor and make their job a little easier we hope.

So, I think that you've got a spring-board now to really go forward into the future and I just hope that's where we go. Kia ora.

J Wano Thank you Ewan. Is that okay with you Nigel?

N Baker (502) Well no not really, it doesn't tell me how you're going to lower your costs and it doesn't tell me how any benefits are going to come to the owners.

J Wano Thank you.

N Baker (502) One of the things in your Trust Order that you were quoting to is that the Trust was supposed to have a putea established, and it does say in the Trust Order the Trust shall establish a putea. Back in 1996 when the Nga Whenua Rahui covenant was applied to the block and there was lump sum payment just on \$1million from the Department of Conservation, the interest of that money was supposed to come to the owners in a putea. Now that's since 1996. Since then there's about \$1.3million in interest that's really just to the Trust administration. That is not what that covenant was put on the land for.

J Wano Thanks Nigel, that's been noted. We've noted that but it wasn't quite like that but we're going to carry on. Anything else to the financials please?

Unknown speaker 1 I just want to refer to page 56 just under 'Summary Income', and I think the accountant mentioned something about the fishing receipts. Just compared to last year they're showing nothing in the way of fishing receipts. Is there some reason for that?

E Gardiner In answer to the question at the back there, what happens is that there is a lump sum paid for a period of time which goes beyond one year. So you could have a receipt one year but it's for several years. I'll stay up here in case there's any other questions.

G Sullivan (178) Through you Mr Chair, I hear what you're saying and I also knew what Cara Bennett, a lawyer who is studying the accounts and she does not share the same opinion. In fact one of her comments was that this Trust is haemorrhaging money. She only said that because she had the evidence there.

J Wano Thanks George, that's been noted. Are there any other matters?

Unknown speaker 1 Just in regards to the interest that's earned on all the term deposits, does the money not compound, does it go somewhere else or does it go into other accounts. In reference to page to page 58 term deposits 3005 and 3006 show the same amounts from the previous year as this year. They would have earned interest so all I'm just trying to say is, is the interest going somewhere else?

E Gardiner As I understand it, it doesn't necessarily compound in the same account but it's taken into the general cheque account and when that builds up it is put into another account and interest bourn on that as well.

J Wano Thank you Ewan.

- G Sullivan (178) Can I ask, in those accounts that you made up where the trustee fees are concerned, I'd like the owners here to know that since I've been a trustees, and Henare, we have not received one cent from the Trust funds so all that money that has been paid out to trustees, Henare and I have not received one cent. It's immoral that we should take money from the owners. We have not received anything at all.
- J Wano Thanks George, can I have a point of order please. Your seat was up here, you choose not to.
- G Sullivan (178) I'm an owner.
- S McKenzie (688) Mr Chairman, by the time I got to read the financials the ink must have run out and it was really hard to read them with my glasses on. I needed it a bit bigger or a bit more ink in the machine.
- J Wano Kia ora, we note and take your point.

6. Election of Trustees

- J Wano We are now moving on to the election process and election of trustees.
- I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Henare and Joe for the time they've spent with the Trust and their outstanding presence with the Trust Board that I've been involved with in the short time I've been here.
- To you Joe, you've been a long-standing member and your input into that over the years has been taken a lot. He was there when our uncle Charlie and Cory and a few others but I'd just like to thank Joe himself and Henare. Henare has put himself forward to be re-elected at this meeting today so thanks for your past work Henare.
- In accordance with clause 7(b)(ii)(a) of the Trust Order, Joseph and Henare retire by rotation and there are six nominees for today's, I mean five because Luke is not here.
- T Houpapa Kia ora ano koutou. Just a note that although Luke is absent you can still vote for him. We'll leave that with you George, if you wish to speak on his behalf.
- We're sorry that we didn't raise this option earlier. While it's ideal that the nominees are here it isn't completely necessary. We just wanted to raise that publicly with the meeting, so that you might make that decision.
- G Sullivan (178) Thank you Traci. I didn't realise that privilege was available. In that case, Luke is still available.
- J Wano So, just to bring us back to order, Luke is available for voting today.
- J Kahukiwa (565) Before you go on, if a trustee is not sitting up there, why do we need them on the Board. If they're not going to sit up there, he's got his own...

J Wano

Thanks, we've noted that. So we have six nominees:

I'd like them to come out in order to address us today.

[Nominees address meeting, G Sullivan represented L Sullivan]

H Ratima (224)

Mihi to those present. Okay, as you heard Traci say, I don't actually need to be here, she's just acknowledged that with Luke so we don't actually have to be here. The second thing is, in the past other trustees, we only used to get three trustees actually turn up to a meeting. At least I've turned up.

Okay, for me, everybody should know who I am at the moment, I hope. I was born on May 5 1950 and I've been an owner since I was 9 years old. I actually received an income off this block from 1959 to 1972 in my own right as a child so I know this block can derive an income, and those of us who have been on this block as owners for 50 years will know that because you used to get an income off this block. My income stopped in 1972, I was 21 when it stopped. So, I have a very good knowledge on what this place can produce. Like I said I've been an owner here for 50 years, most of you people weren't even born then, so that's where my knowledge comes from, and it's all through my own documents that were sent to me as a child.

I'm self employed. I'm a diesel mechanic and I've been self-employed for 19 years. I have a very good idea of how to balance a book, a cheque book otherwise I wouldn't be around. I know how to pay bills and I know how important it is to get good financial advice from people who actually do that for me. Advice is something that I've always sort. I've got advice from lots of people.

Over the last 5 years, I've been here since 2004. I've given 100% to the Trust of my time to you shareholders. I've influenced many changes in this Trust and most of the changes you comfortably have now, a lot of it has been influenced by myself and other people who supported the changes. The first changes that we made was back in 2002 and we introduced a rotation of trustees, and I knew when I became a trustee, it will be me too, that I'll be subject to rotation so I didn't have a problem with introducing a rotation of trustees. The reason why I introduced a rotation of trustees is so you guys can fire us in 12 months, you don't have to keep up and put up with us for 12 years like how you used to. Now we're more accountable to you and so am I. That's the reason for the rotation.

29 June 2002, myself and a few others were responsible for reducing the unrealistic 40% threshold that you had to go through in the past to be able to come to a meeting and have your say. We were able to reduce it to 10% and I think there's a number of trustee owners so we dropped the threshold so you can participate more, and again it's to make us accountable as trustees.

In 2006 I referred the trustees to the WAI 638 and WAI 299 claims. Those of you that knows anything about the claims I referred them to that to help us through some of the problems we were going through on the Trust and namely why the WAI 638 and the WAI 299 claims was because we have a problem with the bridge, of ownership. So the WAI 638 Waitangi Claim which is the Ngati Hineuru Incorporated, that's part of their statement of claim, and the WAI 299 claim so they should know who about who owns the bridge and it's not us. It's actually owned by DoC.

On the AGM on 29 July 2006, I was the returning officer of that hui and of course I filed a report to the trustees...

J Wano

One more minute please Henare.

H Ratima (224)

I'm reading this John. My report found a few discrepancies through the process of how elections were being held on Tatarakaia. In 2001 I was actually stood down by the Trust and I hadn't attended for 5 months, that was overturned in the Court.

Again, there were lots of things, I understand that you will be getting a pot of honey today. That honey has been available to you for the last 5 years, and again it's just continuously hacking at the trustees to do the right thing by you.

At the moment I have an application with the Maori Land Court. The Maori Land Court has ruled in my favour to retrieve the documents so I can't say anymore than that.

J Wano

Can you wrap it up Henare?

H Ratima (224)

Yeah I'll wrap it up now. I've been against excessive trustee fees. There's no real reason for it. When you're having 34 meetings a year you need to question why you're having that amount of meetings in a year. That's why your paying out the trustees \$79,000 in trustee fees, sorry, in administration costs.

J Wano

Can I just bring you to order Henare, it's about you giving you presentation to the families.

H Ratima (224)

So that's what I've been doing in the Trust. That's exactly what I've been doing. I've been trying to make them accountable in financial matters. So again, we're looking at more transparency, accountability and honesty to the shareholders. So that's what I've been doing in the last, since 2004.

J Wano

Horo Edwards.

H Edwards (253, 254)

Mihi to those present. Kia ora whanau, as you all know my name is Horo Edwards. I thank you for giving your korero to us Henare, nau mai piki mai kake mai.

I've been an owner with the Tatarakaia block since I was 10 years old. It was passed to me by my grandfather Horo Watene. Since that time I've come to these hui and seen all the korero come on, and seen all the whanau discuss what's going wrong with our trustees. I'm here to stand today for my tipuna and to thank our trustees that are here today. They have done an excellent job and they've brought a group of people on that's been able to help us to move forward. We want our whenua to be looked after because that's mana whenua mana tangata. It's about time that we did move forward as a whenua, as a people here in Ngati Hineuru.

In regards to myself, I didn't realise that my CV was going to be viewed by all the whanau and I think it's a bit too long but this is part of myself since I was growing up as a young fellow. I've done a lot of things, I've experienced a lot, I went away to Australia for 7 years. I've done my little travels and now I'm back to represent my tipuna.

At the moment I've just finished doing my last wananga in Waitangi for a degree in Social Services, that's to work with our whanau, hapu and iwi. I'm there in my daily mahi to work for my whanau, hapu and iwi, trying to guide them out of colonisation and oppression. It's a hard job and I'm not going to give up. I'm going to be there for our people probably till I can do it anymore.

Really, I haven't got furthermore to say because you've all got it in my CV anyway. Heoi ano, e whakataueki. Taumahi e te ringa whero. No reira tena koutou tena koutou tena hoki tatou katoa. Kia ora.
George, would you like to speak for Luke.

J Wano

G Sullivan (178)

Kia ora tatou katoa. My name is George Sullivan. I've been serving as a trustee for the last 2 ½ years. I'm here to represent my son who sadly is not here because of his wives' problems. I've got his CV which no doubt you will have so I can only add just one or two things that are not here.

[Reads profile and CV] Locally, he did a pilot study of the Toropapa Stream. He did a very indepth scientific study which Ewan can vouch for and on Tataaraakina he also did a pilot study of the Mokomokonui area and a full report of that we've got, and if anybody wants those reports I can supply them to you but that's work he's done in the local rohe. Thank you.

J Wano

Kia ora George. Mark Baker.

M Baker

Kia ora tatou. My name is Mark Baker and I'm honoured to stand here today as a nominee for Tataaraakina C Block Trust. For those here that don't know me, I'm the son of the late John Baker and grandson of the late Charlie Utiera, both former trustees for Tataaraakina. I currently live in the Central Hawkes Bay district with my partner Kirsty and our four children. I'm self-employed operating a successful portable saw-milling business that Kirsty and I started back in 2005.

I have had many experiences on Tataaraakina, right from shooting my first deer to working alongside my grandfather and Joe Young on the operations that were taking place at that time. I've seen with my own eyes the potential that we have here and want to be a part of unlocking more of that potential that this block has to offer.

I bring business skills that I have learnt over the last 5 years and a strong passion to see Tataaraakina strive and grow for the next generation to come. Thank you.

J Wano

Kia ora Mark. We now call on Peter Eden.

P Eden

Kia ora koutou katoa. I'll just a quick brief on myself, I'll be short and sweet. My qualifications you can get off the one-page profile that I submitted.

I sit on the Te Matai Trust which is up the Repia River. I've done 10 years mahi up there with our rangatahi. I think there's opportunity for our rangatahi now to return back to the whenua and I see Tataaraakina as an opportunity to bring a lot of our young people back.

I also sit on the Maungapohatu Trust which is in Tuhoe and are the current Chairman for Ngati Hinepare, Ngati Maahu, Ngati Tawhiao hapu which is in our Ahuriri area.

For me, like the other speaker before, there's a lot of potential in Tatarakaia, I want to see it move ahead. I'm a fan of Mason Durie and he said it's about building a Maori framework around Maori for Maori so I see Tatarakaia as an opportunity to move forward, and I suppose that kotahitanga, just aligning with other Trusts. There is a lot of development happening, and just a current brief, currently there's a project to open up a walkway through to Taupo. It's an old historical walkway and obviously there's potential for a lot of our whanau to be involved in that development and there's opportunity for employment.

That's a big thing for myself, I actually work for Work and Income as an employment broker but I see so much of our young people, and our old people, not in employment.

I think there's potential to obviously grow the block Tatarakaia and developing employment opportunities because far too often we see our people not working on the whenua yet they have the skills. So that's one of my passions, it's helping our people get employment and moving forward. Obviously education, some putea, I heard earlier about the putea grants. Obviously I'm a fan of putea grants because I think we need to give something back to our people and help educate whether it's through education grants or financial grants. I think that's something we need to put in place.

That's a good start I suppose and if I am elected on the Trust it would be good to see a putea that can go back to the owners. Good luck to all my other nominees and thank you for the opportunity to step forward.

J Wano

Thank you Peter. And our last one, Tania.

T Huata-Kupa (501)

Mihi to those present. As a result, I whakapapa through Kahu Tapera II.

I've successfully completed a Certificate in First Steps to Business and I got credits for Accounting Principals and Economic Environment, Introduction to Computer, Employment Relations, Human Resource and Diploma in Business. I've also attended trustee training with BIZ Info and Schools Trustees Association.

I've served 11years in the NZ Army as a regular force soldier. I am on a School Board of Trustees for Pukeamomo and hold the property portfolio. I am currently employed as a budget advisor with the Napier Family Centre and Hastings Budget Advisory Service.

My time in the army gave me education of value and ethos that contribute to a person's character and relationship with others to achieve the common goal for the good of all of us. I have high sense of integrity and honesty. These traits are ideal that soldiers aspire to. Given the range of responsibility trustees have and the diversity of issues facing them I am part of a very successful team of trustees that have achieved outstanding results on behalf of the community and their parents through a good team working relationship with our Principal.

As I mentioned, currently I am employed as a budget advisor, I provide education services to social service organisations, government departments, families and individuals.

So what can I offer the people and hapu of Tatarakina C Trust? Some of the issues that motivate me to want to take part in the role this Board will take on behalf of our people, kaitiaki of the Tatarakina block. The biennial meeting marks the end of an error for the Trust by leaving the grievances of the past behind. While I agree with the Chairman's report, from time to time, decisions will not gain full approval from the owners, this can only be achieved if the Board of the trustees can be transparent, honest and true to the people.

Planning for the future that must be originated and led from the top. Nevertheless it depends on full success and committed contribution from all levels of the team. I am fully aware of the needs of our people and am able to prioritise and focus on the real issues the people are facing. In conclusion, why I've always argued my feelings towards the Nga Whenua Rahui covenant that the Tatarakina Board of Trustee entered into, taking away George Sullivan and Henare Ratima, I do believe we need to move forward to the next stage so that we can advance collectively.

What I can offer is a wealth of experience in working amongst our people within our community. I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank Joe, I'm going to say what's from my heart, it's like he's the last Mohican. I've been involved when uncle Rere was here and Koro was here and I take my hat off to all the trustees because it takes a lot of courage to sit there and get verbal abuse from everyone and still hold your head up high. I'm here for our Puna Whanau Trust and I will never be able to fit into uncle Rere's shoes but I'm here for my uncle. No reira tena koutou tena koutou tena koutou katoa.

J Wano

Kia ora Tania. Tena koutou nga mihi nui nga mihi aroha ki a koutou i tenei ra. No reira tena koutou.

To those that have put themselves forward and presented today I'd like to thank them on their presentation, and very well done. As you can see there's a lot of interest across the board with younger ones taking interest in the whenua, not only the whenua, Ngati Hineuru so thank you.

Just moving to the voting process. As you said before, we will be voting by ballot.

T Houpapa

What will happen now is that you will be issued one a voting form which has an area for you to write your list number and your shares if you know how much you hold. The voting form also gives you the names of the nominees which are the people you've heard just now.

You can vote up to two people. Not three, not four, just one or two. If you have a green form or a yellow form you get one voting form. There is a white box for you up the front on the registration desk for you to put your voting form in. E hoa ma, put one in, not take one out. Kei te pai.

J Wano

Thank you Traci. Just while I've got your attention, we have a representative here from BDO Spicers which we engaged this year as one of the team in administration. This is Glen from BDO Spicers and I'd like to thank you for being here with us today through this process and to you Ewan, thank you for your contribution.

We'll take a break while we're going through this voting. Lunch is at 12.30pm.

T Houpapa Taihoa. We are having a break. If you want to vote, vote before you leave the whare. Don't go out with your forms and then want to come back in after lunch because you won't be able to. Ladies and gentlemen, you've got until 12.15pm to vote.

J Wano I'd like to thank those ones that have put themselves forward. It's been an interesting process for me anyway and thank you very much again.

7. General Business

A Gray (36) Having never been to one of these meetings, how often does the committee meet?

J Wano We meet once a month, usually the third week of the month on either a Thursday or Saturday.

A Gray (36) Here?

J Wano No. In Greenmeadows there's a marae there called Te Poho O Tangiianui.

A Gray (36) Anyone can attend those meetings?

J Wano Yes, by announcement that's okay.

A Gray (36) If you could send out a notice that would be good.

J Wano If you're on the register. Any other general business?

S McKenzie (688) I'd like to know what your pest control, how you're going to do that in the future. Have you got a plan?

J Wano Our process is to work with the agencies that are put in place to deal with those, and we're working close with them to make sure that we're doing the right thing.

S McKenzie (688) Is that with the Animal Health Board, Regional Council and DoC?

J Wano Yes.

S McKenzie (688) And if they decided to use 1080 would you use 1080 again on the block?

J Wano We've gone through a process that allowed us to get there and we're coming to the end of the process. We feel that we don't need to go there in the future but if it calls for it by having more animals eradicated because of the lost of revenue to the shareholders, I would say we'd need to put it to the table.

S McKenzie (688) Is there a lot of Tb on the block?

J Wano Not at this stage.

S McKenzie (688) Was there Tb...

J Wano How many questions do you want?

A Gray (36) It's general business Sir. In general business anyone can talk as often and as long as they want.

J Wano I'm asking for one at a time.

S McKenzie (688) I just wanted to know, if you're going to be using 1080 in the future on the land?

J Wano I can't say that. I can't give you that answer. I may not be here when they make a decision along those lines and I'm not going to say that, while I'm in the Chair, that those people are not going to make it.

J McInnes Who knows what will happen in the next 5-10years with 1080. The Taupo District Council have decided not to apply it by air in their districts. I work for the Western Bay of Plenty District Council and we're currently reviewing our 1080 programme in the Kaimai's and things are pointing in the direction of us not using it as well. So, the directive from Taupo could be a benchmark in the next 5-10years that 1080 would be applied by the air, in other parts of the country as well. That's the benchmark that some Councils are looking to abide by. So if that alleviates your question just a little, if it comes to our table again it will be thoroughly looked at.

S McKenzie (688) I'd just like to say one more thing. I was at that meeting in Taupo where they decided that they weren't going to be using aerial 1080 there. It was also decided in Turangi. It's also been decided in Coromandel on the Peninsula that they're not going to be using aerial drops of 1080 as well. And Ngai Tahu, the iwi down south, two days ago have stepped forward to say that they won't be using aerial 1080 as well.

J McInnes Well that answers my question.

S McKenzie (688) I was just making sure that the land here is going to be safe from 1080.

J McInnes Well no one can say that in the next 5-10 years but the way public perception and public pressure is going in that direction it certainly looks like the abolishment of 1080 may be on the cards. But for us, it's hard to say what it's going to be like.

S McKenzie (688) For you guys as a Trust or?

J McInnes For everyone in New Zealand, not just us.

S McKenzie (688) For you as a Trust, if the Animal Health Board said to use 1080 on the land because you've got a problem out there, can you have an opinion and say yes we can, no we can't, or do you use it because they say that you need to use it.

J McInnes We'd have to research it. If there's a problem with Tb on the property, we'd have to look into it.

S McKenzie (688) And do you research it by going out to the land and having a look or by scientific documentation?

J McInnes Some of us have.

S McKenzie (688) You didn't really answer my question, do you as a Trust make that decision?

J McInnes Well the information that's gathered by individuals like myself and a few others in this room, and also scientific evidence as well, because I look at both sides of the fence I'll make a conscious decision based on facts rather than hysteria, then I hope that kind of answers your question for the next time.

S McKenzie (688) Yes it does, thank you.

G Sullivan (178) Mr Chairman, could a motion made here among the owners against the use of 1080 ever on Tatarakina? Could a motion be made so that the owners could make a decision to save you making a decision when the time comes.

A Gray (36) Are you making a submission.

G Sullivan (178) First of all I was asking if it's possible to make a motion, because if it is I would like to make a motion.

N Baker (502) Of course you can.

A Gray (36) If you want to make one you can make one.

J Kahukiwa (565) I think before you can move a motion on that, what are the alternatives to eradication. I don't vouch for 1080 in any way but if there's an alternative I think you can push a motion through like that.

J Wano At the moment we have a motion by George and a seconder.

J Kahukiwa (565) I think we do need to know if there are alternatives because you can't just say turn off 1080. You may need it really badly for some reason or another, we don't know. But, if there is an alternative it would be good to see.

J Wano It would be. That's the process that we had to go through when we were sitting and going over that whole process. Alternatives were very far and few between. These ones that say they're against it, have they come up with solutions to try and alleviate the problem. It's not only us that are in that programme. I can't go away from the fact that there is a motion on the floor.

G Sullivan Can I make a reply to the former speaker.

J Wano Well no not really George because we're in the motion.

N Baker (502) John, I just want to talk to the motion. In regard to the use of 1080, whether you want it on the block or not that can be controlled at the trustees end. The trustees don't have to opt for 1080 on their land.

 There are alternative methods and they've been applied on other blocks, for instance, Te Matai just across the river there, we banned it, and the Regional Council respected that because we were allowed to do it ourselves. I don't know what information you did get at the time but certainly, I think the stigma that goes with this is that the Trust, looking at the Trust, the Trust have applied 1080 rather than looking at the options not to, looking at other alternative methods and I think that that's why it's created quite a concern in this area.

 Certainly I would have liked to have a look at what the Trust could have gained out of it because of the losses incurred to them from the hunting. It's killed out one part of our...

J Wano Can I just bring it back to order Nigel. We went through a process in Court...

N Baker (502) Well hang on I haven't finished my korero.

J Wano ...and the Court said at that time...

N Baker (502) Who said?

J Wano The Court made a resolution to the opposing of the 1080 and told them that it's common law, it was used and we had to go with that, that's the Regional Council and the Animal Health Board.

N Baker (502) I never seen that order John, at all.

J Wano You were there.

N Baker (502) The order I've seen is that it was up to the trustees to determine whether they should use it or not.

J Wano And we had made a decision.

N Baker (502) There was no basis.

J Wano We've made a decision and we're not going back on the decision that we've made.

N Baker (502) Yes but you asked if there's general business and matters to talk to, there's a motion on the floor to determine whether...

J Wano Yes there's a motion.

N Baker (502) Well I'm talking to the motion. You can't say I'm out of order.

J Wano You're elaborating and going further than the motion. What we're saying is...

N Baker (502) You're not telling the truth to the people. You had the option to say no, that's all we're saying and you opted to go on with it.

J Wano We as a Trust Board made a decision and the decision was to go with the future...

N Baker (502) Yes the Trust made it, that's what we want to hear.

J Wano Yes we did.

S McKenzie (688) Excuse me, we're talking about the future of pest control.

N Baker (502) That's right.

J Wano Yes, we made a decision to go forward. So anyway, back to the motion, and I can't get away from the motion. George made a motion that we don't use 1080 on the block altogether.

Unknown Speaker 2 He's asking for mairano ne. He's asking for mairano, you know it's quite hard that. We also must remember, when the rabbits (*inaudible*) those pakeha down south, they mixed their own, now they can't get rid of them.

 You know why? They didn't use those scientific research the Maori had, they just eat them. That's how they got rid of pests. They eat them. We got to remember, our people were poor. Those fellows in (*inaudible*) might be still doing those sorts of things because they in the forest. What happened to their kai?

 I remember the old Italy chefs saying on TV, when their mothers and fathers used to cook with stale bread and all that, when they started cooking it's was cuisine and yet it's still a stale bread. That's what I'm saying though, times have changed and animals have changed as well. See those rabbits down there they're immune to that forest they mixed up and they can't get rid of the things now. So we've got to be careful. Maori must have had a message and that was to eat them.

 Now you can't eat them because, not full of poison, because it wasn't making fellows any money. Those fellows on the aeroplanes and the fellows who made the poisons, that's why a lot of things stopped for Maori. That's how a lot of our kai got lost. They want to build things in our rivers. They didn't have to ask us they just did it and told us.

 Like you said, they were told by Council you've got to do this, you've got to do that. That's why a lot of our Trusts are in trouble because they say you've got to do this. Why have those laws if you've got to do something else. I wouldn't like to be a trustee anyway, it's too hard.

J Wano Kia ora.

N Baker (502) John the reason why I raised these matters is because...

J Wano Hold on, hold on Nigel.

N Baker (502) ...I've got the figures from the Regional Council...

J Wano Nigel, can we have order please. We've got...

N Baker (502) Hang on.

J Wano No.

N Baker (502) The Regional Council made \$2.2million out of Tatarakaia from the Animal Health Board for the money they paid them to do that aerial drop.

J Wano Nigel you had your turn.

N Baker (502) Hang on John. I want to know what compensation or what approaches did you make for compensation on that basis.

J Wano We had this conversation...

N Baker (502) If the pakeha can get \$2.2million for dropping it on our area, what did we get for compensation for losses? You answer that. I want to see the report, I want to see the report that you did look into it.

J Wano Yes, and you know very well about all that.

N Baker (502) No, no, no but have you got a report. You told us you have. You weighed up everything before you made the decision.

J Wano Can you let us.

N Baker (502) Well hang on you were cutting me off. That's the answer I want to hear. I want to see where is the compensation for allowing these other people to benefit off us.

J Young (312) Kia ora Nigel. I just want to interrupt for a wee while. The next time I attend an AGM I will be with you the people. Horo and Tania I wish you well and congratulate you on your victory today. I'd also like to take the opportunity, it's been a pleasure to work, not only with my Trust Board but it has been excellent with the new management team that has come on board, it will certainly assist this Trust Board to go forward.

All I can say is, it has been my pleasure over 15-20years that I've been involved with the Trust Board. I've seen the various ups and downs and changes, and some of the changes that I'm hearing here today regarding 1080. Those are the things that trustees have to put up with, and sometimes they don't make the right decisions, and sometimes they pick the wrong information but they're still here to represent you and, it will be my turn at the next AGM to be able to ask questions to the new trustees.

In departing, I'd just like to say it has certainly been a pleasure to serve you and serve Tatarakaia. Kia ora.

J Wano Thank you Joe. I haven't got the report for you right not Nigel but we will, if you want one, sent out to anyone that would like a report.

Now, we've got a motion on the table, I'd like to put it to the floor.

T Houapapa Through you Mr Chair, we need to see your registration cards.

- G Sullivan (178) In Parliament people are allowed to cross the floor.
- J Kahukiwa (565) This is not a Parliament.
- G Sullivan (178) The process is the same, there's a democratic process where the, a person can object to what their party is voting.
- J Kahukiwa (565) I'd really rather have you sitting where you belong. That's what we want to see, we want to see the trustees.
- G Sullivan (178) You speak for yourself.
- J Kahukiwa (565) We want to see the trustees.
- G Sullivan (178) So speak for yourself. You don't speak for everyone else. If you were on...
- N Baker (502) Call order Mr Chair.
- J Wano Can I have order please. Can we come back to the meeting thanks.
- [Communications continue between J Kahukiwa (565) and G Sullivan (178)]
- J Wano Any other comments from the floor? Any other general business?
- H Puna (385) Is there anything getting down for the Tataaraakina Bridge.
- J Wano Yes.
- H Puna (385) I'm Hannah Puna, wife of David Puna on Tataaraakina farm. The bridge is uncrossable for us to use. I wrote a letter to our Trust noting my concerns and I got a reply back which I'd like to thank them very much for but it didn't help me with that situation I had because I can't cross it.
